Some Highlights from the Society's History

The Society was formed on 21 February 1907 and called 'The Bournemouth & District Caledonian Society.' Main activities consisting of the celebration of St Andrews Day, Hogmanay and Burns Night.

Membership rises to 254 and activities extend to include whist, socials and lectures. The Society has a President, four Vice Presidents, a Chairman of the Council, a Vice Chairman, twelve Council members, an Entertainment Committee of sixteen members, two pipers, two Auditors, a Treasurer and a Secretary. Determined members Peter Campbell, Jimmy Forbes and Robert Wilson spearhead the quest for a permanent Hall.

The 60th Anniversary of the Society is celebrated at the Wessex Hotel when all the surviving Society's Past Presidents and Life Members were the guests of the Society. The President reads a telegram from the Oueen with the words 'Her Majesty sends her congratulations to the Society on the celebration of its Diamond Jubilee'

The contract to purchase the first Scottish Hall is signed on 31 December 1967 at the Society's Hogmanay celebrations. The Hall was latterly a Salvation Army Youth Centre and was in a dreadful state of repair

A huge amount of physical work is undertaken by a handful of members of the Society to put the Hall into some useable order.

The Society's first Scottish Hall is opened on Saturday 10 May 1969 by Life Member, Mrs M R

On the evening of the 18 January 1979 when the Society members arrived to take part in the pantomime Snow White Highland Spectacular they saw the Hall burn to the around.

Sir Torquhil Ian Campbell Bt, his Grace the 13th Duke of Argyll

The 27th Highland Chieftain of Clan Campbell who became the Society's Honorary President in 2004. He follows his family's predecessor, the 9th Duke as our Honorary President. The Duke was born in 1968 and succeeded to the family title in 2001

First Honorary President

Sir John Douglas Sutherland Campbell, his Grace the 9th Duke of Argyll PC KG KT GCMG

(1907-1914) The 9th Duke of Argyll was the Society's first

honorary President and held the office from 1907 until his death in 1914.

The Duke's family can trace their connection to the Scots' leader, Robert the Bruce in 1296. The Duke's ancestor, Sir Neil Campbell married Robert the Bruce's sister, Lady Mary Bruce. After the Scot's victory at the famous Battle of Bannockburn he was given all the lands which had belonged to the Earl of Atholl, part of which now forms the home of the chief of Clan Campbell at Inveraray Castle, Inveraray Scotland

The Duke owned a house in Bournemouth

and it is likely that he knew the first President of the Society, Dr J Roberts Thomson, who asked him to be a figure-head President.

First Honorary Vice Presidents

Sir Merton Russell-Cotes FRGS JP

(1907-1921)

When the Society was first formed two prominent people were asked to be Vice Presidents. Sir Merton Russell-Cotes was Vice President from 1907 until his death in 1921. Sir Merton married a Scot and lived in Scotland for some time and it is perhaps not surprising that he was asked to become one of the Society's Honorary Vice-President. Sir Merton's son Herbert Victor Michael Cotes is shown in the 1925 List of Members as a member of the Society.

Sir Alexander Oliver Riddell DL LLD JP

Sir Alexander Oliver Riddell was the other Vice President of the Society when it was formed in 1907. He was born in Edinburgh in 1844 and was Deputy Lieutenant of the City of Edinburgh. He was also a Justice of the Peace for the County of Midlothian, a member of the Royal Company of Archers and the King's Bodyguard for Scotland
